

Emergency Supply List

Stock Up!

Every home should have a stash of **Emergency Supplies**. This is in no way an exhaustive list, and we thank our friends at redcross.org, Ready.gov and FEMA.gov for their tips in compiling ours.

Be Prepared for an Emergency.

Keep your basic supplies in a kit you can use at home or easily take with you if you must evacuate.

- Water: 1 gallon per person, per day (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home)
- Food: non-perishable, easy-to-prepare items (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home)
- First aid kit
- Flashlight
- Extra batteries
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible)
- Whistle to signal for help
- Medications (7-day supply) and medical items, extra pair of glasses
- Multipurpose tool
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies)
- Cellphone and charger
- Power bank or external battery to charge mobile devices
- Family and emergency contact information
- Extra cash
- Emergency blanket
- Local map(s)
- Dust mask to help filter contaminated air
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Paper & pencil
- Mess kits: paper cup, plates and plastic utensils, paper towels

Cover Family Needs - Furry ones, too.

A few suggested items to add to your list.

- Medical supplies (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, cane)
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers)
- Games and activities for children
- Pet supplies (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl)
- Two-way radios
- Extra set of car keys and house keys
- Manual can opener
- Pet food, extra blanket or bed, extra leash & collar, extra potable water

Supplies for Common Disasters in your Area.

Be ready for the events most likely to occur near you.

- N95 or surgical masks
- Rain gear
- Towels
- Work gloves
- Tools/supplies for securing your home
- Extra clothing, hat and sturdy shoes
- Scissors
- Entertainment items
- Blankets or sleeping bags
- Fire extinguisher
- Household liquid bleach & medicine dropper: Bleach can be used as a disinfectant diluted at nine parts water to one part bleach. Treat water with 16 drops of regular household liquid bleach per gallon of water. Do not use scented, color safe or bleaches with added cleaners.
